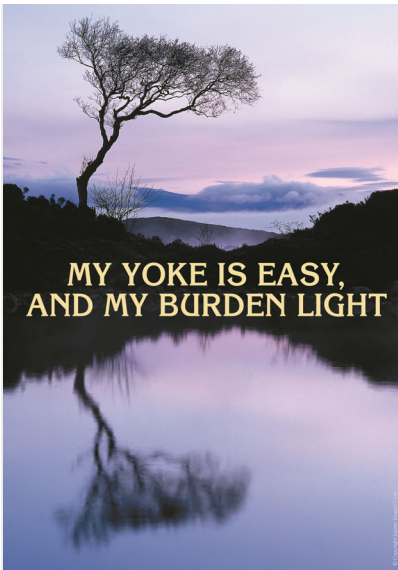

Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time A Scriptural Reflection

We Are Not Debtors

Our King comes, not in the glory of earthly rulers, but as a humble poor man. Jesus tells us how God works in the world. Paul reminds us that we are not debtors to the flesh, but we are free people, liberated to be our best selves, to serve God and each other with humility and joy.

How do we live out this freedom of ours? Many of the world's poor live in severe poverty, their nations' economies weighed down by the yoke and burden of debt. This crushing debt is owed to the wealthy countries of the world, their banks and their investors. Our affluence rests in some measure on the back-breaking poverty of our brothers and sisters.

It is good to contemplate what we can do to relieve or forgive these debts that have been paid many times over, because interest payments are counted first. Pope John Paul II called for forgiveness of such debts, and some progress has been made, yet much suffering remains.

You Will Find Rest

The promise of Jesus is good news indeed. God has hidden the knowledge of the reign of God from the learned and the wise, those who say that the poor are responsible for their own plight, and that nothing can be done for them. Jesus turns such human wisdom on its head, proclaiming instead that God works differently. We are poor in spirit if we follow Jesus in lifting the yoke of the law and slavery to the flesh, freeing the burdened of their crushing load. It may cost our economy some of its profits, but we can believe that our burdens will also be lifted and our work made light. What seems impossible to the learned is known to the humble. When we rest in Christ, laying down the burden of our preoccupation with "things," we can rejoice with all people at the coming of our meek and humble Lord, who brings holy rest to an anxious and materialistic world.

Christian Stewardship and the Need for Recreation

Twelve Random Stewardship Ideas for the Month of July:

1. Think of a charity which is amply blessed at Christmas. Remember them with a gift mid-year.
2. Abstain from something you like – meat, a latte, a cold drink – on Fridays and save the money for a charity.
3. Take your rosary with you for an early morning walk.
4. Recycle more.
5. Each day, say a prayer for one of the world's trouble spots.
6. Turn off the TV, phone, and computer, and spend an hour devoted to someone you love.
7. Surprise an old friend with a phone call.
8. Buy or pick a flower for someone without a "reason."
9. Stop for a moment during your busy day and enjoy an ice cream cone or other favorite treat.
10. If you hear a great homily, tell the homilist.
11. Splurge on some produce and buy enough to share with someone in need.
12. On occasion, try turning your prayer before meals into a spontaneous prayer of thanks, using your own words.

Is there such a thing as a stewardship of recreation? Some people might dismiss the thought. But they'd be wrong. In his book, *The Gift of the Jews*, author Thomas Cahill observes that, in receiving the Ten Commandments, the ancient Hebrews did something no other ancient society had ever done: they established a day of rest. "The God who made the universe and rested bids us to do the same, calling us to a weekly restoration of prayer, study, and recreation (or re-creation)."

For those of us in the Northern Hemisphere at least, probably no other month bids us to relax as the month of July does. Backyard barbecues, days at the pool or the beach, a recreational outing or simply the lazy idleness of a mid-year Sunday afternoon invite us to slow down. And this invitation should be heeded. Sometimes, our society induces in us a sense of guilt if we're not "doing." But turning off the computer and the phone and spending quality time with those around us, or finding time for our own interior lives, is stewardship of our time which leads to the place where God dwells. It's a good example for our kids as well: July presents a wonderful time to "rest" from all the electronic screens and busyness that dominate their young lives.

July is also the month when U.S. citizens celebrate the proclamation of their freedom. When the Hebrew people first received the Ten Commandments, they too had just received their freedom from the Egyptians after a sojourn in the wilderness. Cahill thinks it's no coincidence that a people recently liberated were in need of a directive to rest and reflect. "Leisure," he writes, "is the necessary ground of creativity, and a free people are free to imitate the creativity of God."

So, the next time you feel guilty about a quiet, reflective time of doing "nothing," remember that recreation also means "re-creation." To be a truly creative person, a steward of our interior resources, we must honor our need to rest, relax, be with others, read, and play.

How To Be Happy

Isn't happiness the thing we all strive to find and keep? Nobody is happy all the time, but some people seem to be able to live more contented lives than others. Recent studies on what makes people happy show that it doesn't have much to do with material goods nor high achievement. In the 1970's, researchers followed people who had won the lottery and found that a year after hitting the jackpot, they were no happier than before. We quickly adapt to positive changes in our lives and soon after we get what we've always wanted, we feel the same as we did before, and then start searching for the next new thing to make us happy. Psychologists call it *hedonic adaptation* which suggests that we have a baseline or default level of happiness to which we return after acquiring our latest "fix." Some people have a higher baseline of happiness than others and that can be attributed partially to genetics, but it's also largely influenced by *how we think*. After our basic needs for food and shelter are met, happiness is, as they say, "an inside job." There's no one secret to happiness, but researcher Sonja Lyubomirsky, suggests the following:

Express gratitude. Tell someone you appreciate them. Reflect on your Blessings. Write a thank-you note. Take pleasure in your senses. Celebrate small victories. See beauty in the everyday. Think about past accomplishments. Visualize your best possible future. Identify and replace negative thoughts. Nurture social relationships. Listen. Show more affection. Spend more time with friends. Increase "flow" experiences. Pursue your passions. Challenge yourself. Absorb yourself in an activity. Practice religion or spirituality. Join a religious study group. Meditate. Pray. Reflect. Take care of your body. Eat well. Unwind. Take up a new sport. Develop strategies for coping. Talk through it. Find value in negative events. Be optimistic. Follow your gut. Make enough money to meet your basic needs. Stay close to friends and family. Find happiness in the job you have now. Smile. Forgive. Make friends who share your interests or faith.

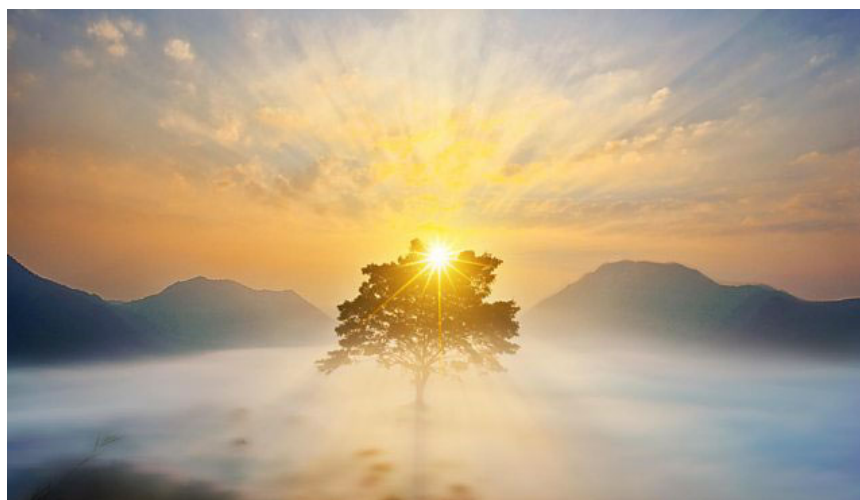
