

Eighteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time A Scriptural Reflection

Listen Heedfully

The invitation to come and satisfy our hunger and thirst in Christ offers a great comfort to us who sometimes ache with longing for God or feel emptiness when we want to feel full of God's love. This longing is God's gift and call to us to withdraw from all the noise and racket of our lives and our world and pay attention to the quiet voice of God within us. How do we respond to such a loving invitation? By paying attention, by stilling ourselves; not by struggling and striving to make some spiritual experience happen, but just by sitting still and listening for God's delicate promptings. Our desire for prayer, even if we feel our prayer to be too distracted and ineffective, is effective because the call is from God and our response is a willingness to hear and be fed by God's holy word to us.

All Ate And Were Satisfied

Jesus fed the five thousand men, "not counting women and children" (Matthew 14:21). We can assume, since women were among his most faithful followers and they tend to bring their children with them everywhere, that the women and children outnumbered the men—a vast crowd indeed! Yet how were they fed with five loaves and two fish? Matthew notes that first, "[Jesus] said the blessing" (Matthew 14:19). He gave thanks to God for what was given: an act of thanksgiving that is always transformative. This act of praise and thanks transforms our bread into his body and blood, and conforms us to Christ for the life of the world. The desire for God is a gift that reflects God's desire for us. It doesn't matter if we feel that our prayer is ineffective, or if we are comforted or not by our images of God. God is working in us by the gift of that desire, and our will to respond is our consent to God's call. Come to the water; come to the feast!

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PASTOR'S **M**ESSAGE

Dear Parishioners:

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of those who were able to join us for the first weekend of our outdoor masses. I was pleased to see a good mix of our parish and school communities at this liturgy. Please continue to encourage your friends and family to join us.

One of the projects that is always ongoing on a property of our size is maintenance. Hopefully you will begin to notice over the next few weeks and months our attention to those "little things" that make a big difference such as fresh paint on doors and railings and renewed attention to landscaping.

One bigger project we will soon be initiating is a repair to the roof over the conference room attached to the rectory which leads into the Church. This roof has had a leak for some time and is beginning to cause extensive water damage both in the Church vestibule as well as in the conference room. I have met with several well respected parishioners regarding this project and we are in the process of securing an updated proposal and hope to have the work begin as soon as possible.

A wonderful part of our Catholic practice and tradition is the use of gestures in our liturgical celebrations such as standing, sitting, bowing and genuflecting. Try to have a ritual sometime without moving. At a birthday party, nobody lights the candles, nobody blows them out, nobody claps after singing. Before a baseball game, no standing and removing hats for the national anthem. It is necessary to involve the body in our many rituals. Catholics have developed and preserved certain gestures as a vital part of our worship. Consider genuflecting, making the sign of the cross on our bodies, kneeling and standing, striking the breast, bowing the head, making a profound bow from the waist, enthroning our hands to receive Communion in them. Because of history, liturgical gestures sometimes seem to be private: Gestures seem to be reduced, done mechanically and without thought, without grace. To bring the vigor into liturgical gesture that it rightfully deserves usually includes two elements: deliberateness and fullness. When people allow their bodies to enter into the gesture fully, their experience of the meaning of the action is enhanced.

However sometimes the object and reason behind these gestures can be lost and so I thought it might be helpful to reflect on a brief passage from *The General Instruction of the Roman Missal* (GIRM) which makes these distinctions regarding a genuflection and a bow: "A genuflection, made by bending the right knee to the ground, signifies adoration, and therefore it is reserved for the Most Blessed Sacrament... A bow signifies reverence and honor shown to the persons themselves or to the signs that represent them. A bow of the body, that is to say a profound bow, is made to the altar." (GIRM 274-275) Therefore, when we are entering the pew at the beginning of Mass or exiting a pew at the end of Mass one should make a "profound bow" to the altar. When crossing in front of the Tabernacle we should genuflect to. Another moment when we use a "profound bow" is during the Nicene Creed when we pray the words "by the power of the Holy Spirit he was born of the Virgin Mary, and became man." The use of gestures during liturgy enables us to engage the whole of our being – mind, body and spirit, in our prayer.

Stewardship and Social Justice

As Mahatma Gandhi challenged us, we all must learn to live more simply so that others may simply live and then peace will flourish in our time. Prayerful discernment of the lifestyle we currently live in light of right relationship to our neighbors near and far is a critical discipline for those who desire to live stewardship with integrity and consistency. The following Global Perspective is a useful tool in this discipline:

- ✦ Every minute of every day, 20 children die of hunger or diseases related to hunger.
- ✦ Two-thirds of humanity lives in crippling poverty.
- ✦ Globally about 800 million people do not have access to adequate food and nutrition. Of those, 200 million are children.
- ✦ 300 million people subsist on less than 65 cents a day.
- ✦ In America, 700,000 people are without shelter on any given night.
- ✦ In Africa, 15% of children die before age 5.
- ✦ 20% of the world's population consumes 85% of all goods and services; the poorest 20% consumes 1%.
