

Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time A Scriptural Reflection

What's What

Today's passage from Matthew's Gospel is loaded with many symbols and details. Our familiarity with the tale of the calming of the sea and Peter's rescue may lull us into overlooking them, or we may simply be unfamiliar with their meaning. Here are things to note: Jesus makes the disciples get into the boat, so there is distance between him and them; the boat, in the Gospels, is always a code word for the church; Jesus goes up a mountain to pray, the place of closeness to God (also the place, in Matthew's Gospel, where Jesus teaches the Beatitudes); the wind and stormy seas can be conquered only by God, as chaos was conquered at creation; Jesus, in prayer to God, is able to know the trouble of his followers, his church, in the boat, even though he is separated from them by a great distance. Matthew packs all these details and symbols into a handful of sentences, yet they are all vital to our understanding of this passage and—more importantly—for our own growth in faith as a church.

Who's Who

Throughout the Gospels and all of the New Testament, Peter stands as an emblem for the whole church. He is a mixture of faith and fearfulness, expresses profound belief in yet also cruel denial of Christ. Peter is the saint and the sinner that every baptized member of the church is. Today he leaps forward in exuberant faith, but caves in to the tempest tossing him about. He musters enough faith to cry out his need for salvation, as we all must. And then Christ, who called him through the storm, identifies himself by saying (literally, in the Greek text), "I Am"—as God was revealed to Moses. Christ, divinely unfazed by the petty storms that terrify his church, always stands ready to reach out to those he has called when they cry for help. "Lord, save me!" was on Peter's lips that morning, as it has been on the lips of countless Christians throughout the centuries. And Christ still reaches out to us, his church being tossed about, to take us by the hand and reply, "Do not be afraid" (Matthew 14:27).

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Dear Parishioners:

This coming week will be a busy one for our parish as we celebrate First Communion and Confirmation. On Tuesday, August 11th we will celebrate the Sacrament of Confirmation for the young people of our parish. Then on Friday, August 14th we will celebrate the Sacrament of First Eucharist with students from our school community. Unfortunately, due to the current restrictions on gatherings, these celebrations will not be open to the public. However, I would ask you to keep these young people in your prayers this week as they prepare for these grace filled moments in their lives.

Please note that, August 15th, Saturday is the Solemnity of the Assumption of Mary. This year this celebration is NOT a Holy Day of Obligation and in keeping with our current practice Mass will NOT be celebrated that day


This feast, which has been celebrated in the Church since the early 5th century, was officially proclaimed by Pope Pius XII in 1950 when he stated: "The Immaculate Mother of God, the ever Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory." In her assumption, Mary was preserved from the decay of death. Mary, the mother of the Savior, is the first to share in the Lord's resurrection and therefore she is the living model for all people whose future destiny is with the risen Lord. In a homily a few years ago on the occasion of this celebration Pope John Paul II reminded us "Perhaps, more than in the past, modern man is consumed by material interests and concerns. He seeks security and often feels lonely and anxious. Then what can be said of the enigma of death? Mary's Assumption is an event that concerns us precisely because every human being is destined to die. But death is not the last word. Death - the mystery of the Virgin's Assumption assures us - is the passage to life, the encounter with Love. It is the passage to the eternal happiness in store for those who toil for truth and justice and do their utmost to follow Christ."

(Pastor's Message continued)

I would like to share with you this brief passage from the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops office on Immigration. Central American children from El Salvador, Guatemala and Honduras are migrating to the United States alone in record numbers. While not a new phenomenon, the number of children who are making the perilous journey alone has increased exponentially—6,775, on average, arrived between 2003—2011, and upwards of 90,000 are projected to arrive in Fiscal Year 2014 (October 1, 2013—September 30, 2014) A delegation of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) traveled to Central America in November 2013 and reported in Mission to Central America: The Flight of Unaccompanied Children to the United States that multiple interrelated factors are contributing to the increase in forced child migration. Some of these factors include: a lack of strong social institutions and civil society support, abuse in the family stemming from pressure on family units due to violence and family separation, a lack of viable economic and educational opportunities, and environmental factors affecting crop production. However, the delegation reported that "one overriding factor has played a decisive and forceful role in recent years: generalized violence at the state and local levels and a corresponding breakdown of the rule of law have threatened citizen security and created a culture of fear and hopelessness." The sanctity of the family and the need to protect the vulnerable is an integral element of Catholic approach to service and pastoral care in the United States. This is evidenced in the January 2003 pastoral statement on migration of the US and Mexican Catholic Bishops, *Strangers No Longer: Together on the Journey of Hope*, which specifically speaks of the unaccompanied child, noting this special population's heightened vulnerability, and the corresponding need for special consideration and care that these children should receive. It is the view of the Church that protecting family values should not depend on a family's nationality or immigration status and through its Justice for Immigrants Campaign USCCB promotes humane and compassionate immigration reform that preserves the family unit as the cornerstone of the immigration system.

Perhaps, like Elijah, we will be surprised at what we find. And, like the disciples, we can add our voice to the confession, "Truly you are the Son of God."

Stewardship...A Response to God's Gifts

Question: How do we faithfully incorporate stewardship into daily life?

Answer: Every person is a steward of some kind. None of us can escape being a steward of God's possessions - whether in a good way or in a bad way. This includes our handling of money, our treatment of other people, and our worship of God.

Noah was a giving steward in worship when he built the Ark in obedience to God's warning and promise. Abraham worshipped God as a giving steward when he left his home for a better promise. He became the Old Testament model for all the faithful to follow. Moses was a giving steward who worshipped God through the patterns of worship that were revealed by God as pleasing to him. Similarly, Joshua and David gave themselves as the great warriors and Kingdom builders of God through worshipful stewardship.

But we Christians have a greater blessing and responsibility in comparison to the Old Testament faithful because we have the reality of the giving Christ living within us. Jesus came to earth as the generous steward of our salvation. He showed us how we are to imitate him by giving ourselves in worshipful service. Jesus showed us how worship and giving flow together. He is both the Savior and the Model for a godly lifestyle that God can use to win unbelievers to Christ and to nurture believers toward greater maturity.

God's question is this: "What kind of steward are You?" Jesus presented the options in his parables and his teachings when he contrasted bad stewards and good stewards. The bad stewards are careless, callous, and selfish. The good steward follows Jesus, accepts the gifts of life divinely conferred, and uses these gifts in giving worshipfully to the end.

Stewardship Thought: We don't give because we have a lot and can afford it; we give because of a desire to share what we have with others.
